About the Wally Scott Bursary

Each year, minor hockey associations across the OMHA support numerous charities and charitable foundations. Hundreds of thousands of dollars are generated and many causes and programs benefit from this support.

In 2000 the Minor Hockey Foundation Ontario (MHF) was created to support minor hockey players in the Province of Ontario. The Foundation assists players seeking post-secondary education, players who require financial assistance in order to play minor hockey, and the Let's Learn Hockey Program.

This document will focus on the Wally Scott Bursary. The Wally Scott Bursary is given in recognition of outstanding commitment to community service, athletics, and academics. This bursary reflects the achievements of a young hockey player who is committed to his or her community, athletic ability, and academic achievement. Each approved recipient may receive between \$1,000 and \$2,500 towards his or her post-secondary education. Bursary amounts are subject to change depending on available funds. There will be a maximum of two bursary winners awarded per year. Bursaries will be issued to the applicant's post-secondary institution.

Eligibility

The MHF Executive Board reviews all applications and a member of the Board will contact the applicant to confirm whether their request has been received. All applicants must adhere to the following guidelines:

1. All requests can only be made for players aged up to twenty years and must have been a registered player in the Ontario Minor Hockey Association for a minimum of five years.
2. A player attending a post-secondary institution during the upcoming year.
3. Maintain a high standard of academic excellence.
4. Active in their local community programs (any community sport or social program).

How to Apply

1. Candidates must complete the attached application form and submit it to the MHF by 4:30 pm on April 15 of the calendar year. Each application will be reviewed for a period of four to six weeks. Upon receiving the application, the MHF will contact the applicant by mail with an acknowledgement letter. Each applicant will be contacted by the MHF no later than seven weeks after the application is submitted. The successful applicant(s) will be asked to attend the Ontario Minor Hockey Association Annual General Meeting for a presentation.
2. Provide a one-page letter outlining their request.
3. Provide a one-page letter from the President of their local minor hockey association supporting their request.

- * Only one application per household or family.
- * Incomplete applications will not be accepted.

About Wally Scott

The game of hockey was a constant force in Wally Scott's personal and professional life for over sixty years. He demonstrated this lasting commitment to the game as a coach, fan, father, grandfather and legal counsel. Without question, he was a passionate advocate of the game.

Wally's coaching experience commenced during World War II. His team of service men who played in the Lake Superior area had two players who developed a national profile in the professional leagues after the war. In 1944-45 he served as signal officer in HMCS Kapuskasing involved in convoy escort.

His minor hockey coaching began as his three sons started playing the game: 1962-1966, Atom and Midget teams; and, 1966-1969, Bantam and Midget teams. In 1969, and for the next six years, Wally coached the Lindsay OHA Junior team, registering as an Ontario Finalist in 1973 and 1975. As a grandfather, Wally continued his coaching - from the bleachers!

Wally graduated from Osgoode Hall in June 1949. He served as legal counsel for the OMHA for over 25 years. During that period, he was involved in several landmark cases on behalf of the OMHA.

Over the decades, Wally's personal and professional interests in hockey merged to the benefit of the OMHA. The award presented in his name is intended to recognize his contributions and commitment to the OMHA and to the game of hockey.
